Teaching Canadians to save themselves and rescue others

Annually, over 1.2 million Canadians participate in our swimming, lifesaving, lifeguard, first aid and leadership programs. Each year, we certify thousands of instructors who provide the leadership for our training programs. Over 30,000 Canadians earn our Bronze Medallion each year. As Canada's lifeguarding experts, we set the standard for lifeguard training and certify Canada's National Lifeguards.

Making Canadians Water Smart®

The Lifesaving Society focuses Water Smart drowning prevention efforts on people most at risk — like men fishing in small boats — or on those who can make a significant difference, such as parents of young children. We deliver Water Smart messages through our swim program, media and community action. Our Swim to Survive® program provides the essential minimum skills required to survive an unexpected fall into deep water.

Drowning research

The Lifesaving Society conducts research into fatal and non-fatal drowning, aquatic injury and rescue interventions. Ongoing research and analysis supports the Society's evidence-based water-rescue training and Water Smart drowning prevention education.

Setting the standard

The Lifesaving Society establishes aquatic safety standards and consults on aquatic safety issues for the aquatic industry, governments and the judiciary. The Society offers a suite of services to help aquatic facility operators maintain and improve safe pool and waterfront operations. We perform aquatic safety audits and serve as experts in legal cases involving aquatic safety.

Lifesaving sport

The Lifesaving Society is the Canadian governing body for lifesaving sport — a sport recognized by the International Olympic Committee and the Commonwealth Games Federation. We use lifesaving sport to engage and inspire youth in our drowning prevention mission. Our Lifesaving Sport Fundamentals program offers a recreational introduction to lifesaving sport skills. Junior, senior and masters athletes compete regionally, provincially, nationally and internationally. We offer certification programs for officials and coaches.

The Lifesaving Society

The Lifesaving Society is a full-service provider of programs, products and services designed to prevent drowning. We save lives and prevent water-related injury through our training programs, Water Smart public education, drowning research, aquatic safety management and lifesaving sport.

We are a national volunteer organization and registered charity composed of ten provincial/territorial branches, tens of thousands of individual members, and over 4,000 affiliated swimming pools, waterfronts, schools and clubs.

The Lifesaving Society is a leader and partner in the delivery of water safety education throughout Canada and around the world. (The Society operates globally in over 25 countries.) We represent Canada in the Commonwealth Royal Life Saving Society and we are Canada's Full Member in the International Life Saving Federation. The Lifesaving Society takes lead responsibility for drowning prevention in Canada.

We have been teaching swimming, water safety and water rescue in Canada since 1896. Established in England (1891) as The Swimmers' Life Saving Society, we became The Royal Life Saving Society in 1904. Today, we are known as simply the Lifesaving Society.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I never imagined I'd be starting this report with a reference to Dr. Seuss, but in reflecting on 2024 and the incredible accomplishments that have been achieved, "Oh, the Places You'll Go!" was the first thought that came to mind.

As the story begins, "Congratulations! Today is your day. You're off to Great Places! You're off and away!"

So, in the spirit of Dr. Seuss, away we go...

2024 was a milestone year for all our activity centres. Leadership wrapped up a project launched in 2015 by the Leadership Task Force. It was a marathon — not a sprint! The talented Leadership team successfully popped the last piece into the Society's leadership training system with the launch of an inperson recertification course for instructors, coaches, examiners and examiner mentors. The Leadership section of this report highlights the success of the new program.

Training Programs celebrates the first time participation numbers in the Society's many program offerings surpassed one million (see Awards Report, page 6). Training Programs was busy hosting Seasonal Affiliate Meetings, pre-revision Swim for Life and Swim Patrol meetings, Swim Update Clinics as well as Lunch 'n' Learn webinars. Training Programs also supported the National Sports Commission of Guyana... take a peek at page 11 for more on this exciting initiative.

Friendly competition is de rigueur for the team in Lifesaving Sport, and competitor and club development continued through Ontario Championships in the Town of Essex, City of Orillia, City of Markham and the Town of Saugeen Shores. Ontario continues to be a leader in sport development including the phenomenal dedication repeatedly demonstrated by officials and volunteers. We look forward to watching Lifesaving Sport continue with this momentum in 2025 and beyond.

Public Education continues to lead the way contributing to our collective mission and approved applications for almost 88,000 students in the Swim to Survive and Swim to Survive+ programs. National Drowning Prevention Week featured numerous successful community events including World Drowning Prevention Day (July 25, 2024) saw numerous buildings and monuments across Ontario "Go Blue." The interest generated in 2024 is sure to grow, and I look forward to reporting on even more blue in the next annual report. Public Education was also instrumental in the Society's distribution of a letter to 100,000 members supporting the Society's position of mandatory wearing of lifejackets/PFDs for all ages in small recreational vessels. With Ontario Drowning Report figures continuing to demonstrate lack of PFD use in boating incidents, it is vital that we continue to advocate for these critical layers of safety.

"Great places" are nothing new for Safety Standards, which completed an incredible 10 safety audits in pools and waterfronts in 2024. They also developed a Major Incident Management toolbox as an important resource for post-incident support. In addition, research partnerships with Toronto Metropolitan University, the University of Windsor and Conestoga College produced work in valuable aquatic topics such as beach water monitoring, communication, lighting levels in indoor pools and heat stress. Management Training continued to provide innovative training and certification opportunities to aquatic and facility staff via conference opportunities, webinars and courses, including work on Pool Operator and Safety Management Inspection courses.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The summary financial information presented here is derived from the Royal Life Saving Society Canada, Ontario Branch ("the Society") audited consolidated statements for the year ended December 31, 2024. These include the results of the Drowning Prevention Research Centre Canada, a federally incorporated registered charity controlled by the Society. Detailed audited consolidated financial statements of the Royal Life Saving Society Canada, Ontario Branch are available upon request.

The Society reported net revenue of \$11.6 million in 2024, with expenditures of \$11.3 million, resulting in a surplus of \$365,000. This represents a decline from the \$1.2 million surplus achieved in 2023, primarily due to increased expenditures, particularly in salaries and benefits, alongside a modest revenue contraction in certain areas. Despite this, the Society remains in a strong financial position, continuing to invest in its core programs and strategic initiatives.

Water Rescue generated net revenues of \$4.1 million, representing a 2% decline compared to 2023. This moderation reflects a leveling-off in course registrations, indicating that the growth momentum following the Swim Transition has stabilized.

Literature net revenues totaled \$2.4 million, down 2% from 2023, as affiliates drew down stock-piled book inventories rather than making new purchases. This trend confirms the normalization in demand following the heightened adoption of new materials during the Swim Transition period.

Leadership net revenues grew notably, reaching \$1.3 million—20% above 2023. This expansion was driven by new affiliates following the Swim Transition and more instructor certification volumes linked to higher activity levels in Toronto contract training programs.

Merchandise sales declined 15% year-overyear to \$503,000, largely due to the exit from the U.S. market through Barrier Waterman and lower sales of specialized equipment, such as AquaEye devices. Lifesaving Sport continued to gain traction, with net revenues rising 7% to \$262,000. This was fueled by growing participation in both local and national competitions, reflecting the Society's ongoing efforts to enhance the visibility and engagement of its Sport programming.

Other income sources increased again in 2024. Investment income was \$992,000, up from a strong \$858,000 in 2023, with two years of strong investment portfolio returns of 15.8% and 20.5%, respectively. Also, Swim to Survive grants utilized were \$1.3 million, up from \$1.2 million in 2023.

Total expenditures in 2024 rose to \$11.3 million, an increase of 9% from the prior year, driven primarily by higher salaries and benefits, including new hires to support programs, increased Swim loyalty "cash back" paid to affiliates and higher travel and meeting costs that supported the increased activities reflected in competitive sport, all of which gets allocated across multiple program areas.

The Society secured a \$2.3 million mortgage to purchase its new headquarters and withdrew \$2.1 million from investments in 2024 to support the new office and warehouse relocation. The negative working capital primarily reflects this new mortgage debt and withdrawn investment principal. Despite the outflows, the Society maintained a year-end investment balance of \$5 million.

In conclusion, the Society's financial performance in 2024 was once again strong, characterized by growth across various programs and prudent expense management. It remains well-positioned for sustained success in advancing its mission of preventing drowning and reducing water-related injury in the ensuing years.

LEADERSHIP

The Leadership Activity Centre contributes to the Society's mission by developing the instructors, coaches, examiners and trainers who teach Ontarians how to swim, how to rescue, and how to be safe in, on and around the water. Leadership supports the mandates of Training Programs, Lifesaving Sport, Safety Standards, Management Training, Public Education and Area Services.

This passionate group is lead by Leadership vice president Kerry Wakefield and chairs Elisabeth Drouillard, Jason Jolicoeur, Charlene Pugh, Tiffany Vis and Tamara Wood.

Recertification Launch

Recertification is a significant requirement for those holding Lifesaving Society leadership certifications. To remain current, leadership personnel must recertify their leadership awards every 24 months. This results in over 14,000 recertifications annually in Ontario.

In 2024, the Society introduced a modernized Leadership recertification system featuring a new "points" system designed to encourage the earning of awards and acquiring new skills, and to recognize significant contributions individuals make to the Society.

An in-person recertification course also provides instructors, coaches, examiners and examiner mentors an alternative way to earn the necessary four points for recertification in a course format. The four-hour in-person course streamlines the leadership recertification process for those currently certified and for those previously certified who want to re-engage in their aquatic careers. In its first 12 months, the in-person course recertified almost 1200 individuals!

Leadership recertification was part of the Society's competency-based leadership system that began in 2015. Originally, **Brad McConnell** chaired the recertification topic on the Society's Leadership Task Force. The current Leadership Council, led by **Jason Jolicoeur**, brought this project to conclusion.

We express our deepest gratitude to everyone who contributed, including past and present members of the Leadership Task Force and Leadership Council. A special thank you to **Kerry Wakefield**, **Tamara Wood**, **Marek Holke**, **Katie Short** and **Adam Eastman** for their unwavering dedication in this initiative.



OTAS Recertification

The Ontario Teachers' Aquatic Standard (OTAS) program is designed for secondary school teachers who teach basic swimming skills, drills and progressions to students in indoor school pools.

The OTAS certification was revised in 2023. In 2024, **Jason Jolicoeur** and **Kerry Wakefield** completed the OTAS recertification module, ensuring that teachers can continue to effectively implement and run the program in their school pools.

Don Fawcett Bursary

The Don Fawcett Leadership Bursary provides financial assistance to high school students pursuing aquatic leadership certifications. Eligibility is restricted to students enrolled in Ontario boards of education that participate in Ontario Teachers Aquatic Standard (OTAS). Peel District School Board students Jake Dellio, Olivia Dellio and Evan Robinson were awarded bursaries in 2024.

The Bursary honours the memory of Don Fawcett, educator and former executive director of the OTAS program, in recognition of his leadership and dedication to the aquatic field.

National Trainer Summit

Thirty-four National Trainers from Ontario and Atlantic provinces came together virtually in November to share, network and provide input into project work for the Society. Thank you to **Charlene Pugh** and **Tamara Wood** for leading the charge on this valuable opportunity and for the support from **Lis Drouillard, Jason Jolicoeur** and **Kerry Wakefield** in executing the event.

Quality assurance and certification review

The effectiveness of the Society's training programs relies on upholding its certification standards. The Society investigated written complaints in 2024 concerning standards, program delivery and behaviour. Investigations led to six formal Certification Reviews and one Appeal. These reviews resulted in sanction, temporary suspension, revocation or decertification for various offenses.

We thank Patrick King (VP Training Program) and Kerry Wakefield (VP Leadership), who took lead roles on behalf of the Board. MANAGEMENT TRAINING

Management Training contributes to the mission of the Society by providing training and certification opportunities for leadership personnel who help aquatic facility owners, managers and operators prevent drowning and water-related incidents.

In April, **Paul Di Salvo** assumed new responsibilities as President-Elect and **Sean Duffy** succeeded him as Vice President Management Training. A veteran volunteer of the Safety Standards and Management Training activity centres, **Minnie Fisher** retired after many years of securing speakers and coordinating conference sessions.

Professional development

Minnie Fisher ensured the successful delivery of Lifesaving Society sessions at the 2024 PRO Aquatic Conference. She also ensured that Society representatives presented on aquatic safety topics at regional workshops such as YRAC and SMAC.

Aquatic management training

Management Training Chair **Jerry Lynch** monitored the new Aquatic Supervisor and Aquatic Manager programs and was the final certifier of safety management leadership personnel who apprenticed in 2024.

Pool operations

David Pignataro, Pool Operations Chair, continued work on the revision of the Society's Pool Operator programs in preparation of the development of new leadership materials. He conducted a survey seeking input to these revisions, the results of which were discussed by the Management Training Council. With additional input from the field, the Council of Officers approved Management Training's motion to revise the Society's two-level Pool Operator program as a single-level course. Efforts have turned to the development of program content and instructor resources.

Management proficiency

Jennifer Fruscella, chair of this committee, focused her efforts on the review of the Lifesaving Society's 2018 Staff Shortage Report, surveying affiliate members, hosting a Council of Officers session to gather input, and finally producing a report late in 2024. She continues to focus on this project and will continue to build a database of resources that affiliates can use to address this issue.

Webinars

Webinar chair **Nikolay Nikolov** joined Management Training Council in 2024. He began by researching topics for Lifesaving Society hosted webinars and setting an annual calendar of webinars for 2024–2025. In 2024, he hosted webinars on topics that assisted over 700 registered attendees in the management of safe aquatic facilities. These webinars were recorded and posted to the Lifesaving Society's YouTube channel.



Safety Management Inspection courses

Vicktor Verblac, new Chair of Safety Management Inspection Courses, got out of the gate quickly and began drafting an award guide and related PowerPoint presentation for Aquatic Safety Inspector Instructors.

SAFETY STANDARDS

Safety Standards contributes to the mission of the Society by setting and clarifying standards and by providing tools that help pool and waterfront owners, managers and operators prevent drowning and maximize public safety.

2024 was a year of renewal in the volunteer ranks of the Safety Standards Council. Following decades of skilled and dedicated leadership, **Gary Sanger** stepped down as vice president. **Nathalie V Martin** retired as Research Chair after 13 years of service and a legacy of strong project relationships with the universities that train Ontario's public health inspectors.

Under the leadership of new Vice President **Lisa Adams**, the Safety Standards Council welcomed new chairs: **Wasi Rizvi** (Research), **Patrick D'Almada** (Safety Audits) and **Andrea Slade** (Safety Standards).

Research partnerships

Under the direction of **Nathalie V Martin** and now **Wasi Rizvi**, the Society continued research with its partners Metropolitan Toronto University (formerly Ryerson University), the University of Windsor and Conestoga College. Research topics in 2024 included "Beach Water Monitoring Programs in Ontario: An Assessment of Publicly Available Information"; "Variations in Communication"; and "Assessment of Lighting Levels in Indoor Pools." Work began on research into heat stress on lifeguards.

Audit services

The Lifesaving Society completed 10 safety audits in Ontario swimming pools and waterfronts in 2024.

Safety Audit Services chairs **Lisa Adams** and now **Patrick D'Almada** continued development work on an aquatic industry safety awards program and updating audit resources for 2024. Lisa added new applications to assist with the safety audit process. WhatsApp allowed auditors to inspect, record and add photos to a database which would assist in building comprehensive reports. Updates to the UDATA database reflected changes in standards and modifications for audit report recommendations.

A Chief Auditor Recertification clinic delivered by Patrick D'Almada in October updated 12 Chief Auditors.

Incident management resources

Incident Management Chair **Teresa Taylor** developed a Lifesaving Society Major Incident Management toolbox with resources to assist supervisory staff and pool operators in the aftermath of major incidents. Teresa also developed a survey to monitor use of current online resources and to seek input on future revisions and new resource development.

Regulation Review

In 2024, under the guidance of chair **Janice Carroll**, the Regulation Review Committee focused on a review of the Society's current waterfront safety and waterslide standards. This work continues into 2025.

Court and Inquest

Rob Richardson, Chair of the Court and Inquest Committee submitted the "Amelia Yeoman Inquest Report" for approval by the Safety Standards Council. The committee has turned its attention to a case involving the drowning of a young man in Algonquin Provincial Park.

Safety Standards

All existing safety standards are now accessible on the Lifesaving Society Ontario website. Safety Standards Chair **Andrea Slade** leads an initiative to develop a standard on the use of electronic devices in aquatic facilities.

National Safety Standards Commission

Representing Ontario on the Society's National Safety Standards Commission, **Sean Duffy** participated in the development of several new national standards in 2024. These are available on the Society's national website. **Michael Shane** assumed Ontario's spot on the commission when Sean moved to new responsibilities as Management Training Vice President.

Expert witness

In 2024, the Lifesaving Society was retained as an expert in eight cases to assist law firms in reviewing incidents in aquatic settings in Ontario, Quebec and Prince Edward Island.

LIFESAVING SPORT

Lifesaving sport is the only sport whose skills are first learned for humanitarian purposes. Through lifesaving sport, the Lifesaving Society seeks to engage and inspire youth in our drowning prevention mission.

Ontario's lifesaving sport community experienced a remarkable year featuring 12 sanctioned regional competitions and seven provincial championships. This year saw the participation of 652 competitors across 26 clubs, showcasing exceptional athleticism, teamwork and dedication to lifesaving sport and its drowning prevention mission. Additionally, four TeleGames drew 486 participants from 12 clubs. TeleGames continue to be a vital initiative, connecting athletes from different regions and fostering grassroots engagement in lifesaving competition.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

Public Education contributes to the mission of the Society by increasing awareness of the risks associated with activities in, on and around water. The aim is to modify Ontarians' at-risk behaviour to eliminate drowning and water-related injury.

School grant program

The Society approved applications for 71,591 Grade 3 students and 16,219 Grade 7 students for Swim to Survive and Swim to Survive+ training respectively for the 2023/24 school year.

The school grant programs would not be possible without the generous support of the **Ontario Ministry of Education** since 2006. In August 2024, the Ministry confirmed a grant of \$1.7 million to support the Society's school grant program through the 2024/2025 school year.

Special thanks to **Jillian Hamilton** for her guidance and assistance as part of the Application Approval Committee. The Society greatly appreciates the long-standing and continuing support of **PPL Aquatic, Fitness and Spa Group** for the Swim to Survive and Swim to Survive+ programs.

National Drowning Prevention Week

The Lifesaving Society designated July 21–27 as National Drowning Prevention Week (NDPW) to focus community and media attention on the drowning issue and drowning prevention. NDPW provides a focus around which community educators can plan news releases, do media interviews, and deliver public demonstrations and other events. Many successful community events took place across Ontario. Resources were shared on our website for affiliates, partners and community coalitions with a focus on non-fatal drowning and the importance of lifejackets.

World Drowning Prevention Day

The UN General Assembly Resolution on Global Drowning Prevention designated July 25 as World Drowning Prevention Day to be observed globally every year. Activities in Canada varied by province. Lifesaving Society Ontario shared social media posts and encouraged buildings/monuments to "Go Blue" on July 25. Participants included: Toronto's CN Tower, the Fred A. Lundy Bridge in Newmarket, Lansdown Park in Ottawa, Mississauga Clock Tower, Niagara Falls, Oakville Performing Arts Centre, Oakville Town Hall, the OTTAWA sign in ByWard Market, Riverwalk Commons in Newmarket, Ottawa's TD Place, Vaughan City Hall and Windsor City Hall.

Water Smart contest

Municipal Chair **Judith Schultz** led the 2024 Water Smart colouring contest won by **Jimmie Simpson** (6–10 years) and **Josiah Lewis** (11–15 years).

Mandatory lifejacket wear

The Lifesaving Society prepared and distributed a letter to more than 100,000 members encouraging them to participate in Transport Canada's Public Consultation on Mandatory Wearing of Personal Floatation Devices & Lifejackets (September 4 – November 4, 2024) in support of the Society's position of mandatory wearing of lifejackets/PFDs for all ages in recreational vessel types six metres or less in length.

Research

The Lifesaving Society reports on drowning and unintentional water-related deaths. These reports provide a comprehensive fact base to guide the Society and others in developing effective drowning prevention solutions. Data for Canadian provinces and territories is extracted from the Offices of Chief Coroners and Medical Examiners and analyzed by the Drowning Prevention Research Centre Canada (DPRC) — the lead agency for drowning and water-incident research in Canada.

Fatal drowning

In 2024, the DPRC produced provincial/territorial infographic reports for Lifesaving Society Branches in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Québec, Newfoundland and Labrador, and for Northern Canada. The DPRC also produced a 2024 national infographic report and the 2024 Canadian Drowning Report for Lifesaving Society Canada.


Delays in data availability in some provinces/territories caused by Covid-19 continue, but where available, the most current data was provided to each Branch across the country. Nationally, data was available for years up to and including 2019. In Ontario, data was available for years up to and including 2020.

Interim drowning data

Interim data offers a glimpse into the drowning mortality rate of any given year. Interim data on fatal drownings is derived from internet and media monitoring services across Canada. This data is later reconciled with Coroner and Medical Examiners' reports. Annually, it provides information on approximately half of all drowning fatalities in Canada.

In Ontario, preliminary interim data showed an overall 8% decrease in 2024 drowning incidents compared to 2023.

Increased media reports involving aquatic incidents were reported in 2024 (+16%). This was offset by a decrease in reports involving boating activities (-20%).

In Ontario, fewer drownings among children under 5 years were reported than in previous years, but the number of media reports involving adults 20–34 years increased (+26%). There were noticeable decreases (-45%) in reported drownings among adults 65 years and older.

By comparison, interim data for Canada indicated an overall increase in fatal drownings (+7%). Increases in reported drownings in New Brunswick (+100%), Manitoba (+27%) and British Columbia (+17%) were offset by decreases in Nova Scotia (-22%), Ontario (-8%) and Quebec (-5%).

There was a rise in fatalities involving non-aquatic activities: falls into water increased 27% and boating fatalities increased 10%.

Mapping boating-related drowning incidents

Work concluded with the DPRC on the second phase of an innovative three-year Transport Canada-funded boating safety project to map boating-related incidents in three recreational boating communities in Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia. The final report was submitted to Transport Canada in March 2024.

Newcomers to Canada

The Society continues to update its understanding of the drowning prevention needs of Canada's multicultural population. In 2024, the Society surveyed approximately 3,000 adult residents of Canada (Canada born and non-Canada born) to identify drowning risk among different ethnic groups; to identify barriers to participation in aquatic activities; and to identify drowning prevention strategies and ways to encourage participation in swimming and lifeguarding programs.

Respondents born outside Canada included international students, refugees and immigrants. Immigrants were further identified as those who have lived in Canada more than five years and fewer than five years.

MEMBER SERVICES

Member Services develops and maintains the corporate functions, systems and infrastructure required to support and service the membership of the Society.

Governance

The National Society is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors nominated by provincial/territorial branches and elected at the Society's AGM. National commissions are led by volunteer commissioners who report to the Board of Directors. These commissions are: Training Programs, Lifesaving Sport, Safety Standards and International Relations. A management team is comprised of senior staff of the 10 branches.

Lifesaving Society Ontario is governed by an elected volunteer Board of Directors with a volunteer Council of Officers and nine activity centre councils composed of professionals in recreation, education, business, finance, management, and medical and legal professions.

Ontario Board of Directors

The Board of Directors governs the Lifesaving Society Ontario in accordance with its mission and bylaws. Directors are elected for a two-year term by the Society's membership at the annual general meeting. No person or body external to the Society is entitled to appoint any directors. Directors appoint all officers, including council and area chairs, and approve activity centre plans.

In May, Past President **Julie Dawley** stepped down to be succeeded by former president **Julie MacIsaac**.

Ontario Council of Officers

The Council of Officers is composed of two representatives of each activity centre council (see below), the president as chair, and the president-elect. Members of the Council of Officers are nominated by the respective activity centre council and appointed by the Board of Directors for two-year terms.

The Council of Officers represents active, affiliate and award members; manages topics not assigned to a single activity centre (e.g., governance review) or topics that are the responsibility of multiple activity centre councils (e.g., affiliate recognition review); and monitors the work of the Board of Directors. Any member of the Society may attend and speak at meetings of the Council of Officers.

Activity Centre Councils

Lifesaving Society Ontario organizes its drowning prevention work in activity centres: Training Program, Leadership, Public Education, Safety Standards, Management Training, Lifesaving Sport, Fundraising, Member Services and Area Services.

Activity centre councils are chaired by the topical vice-president or an individual appointed by the board. Councils are composed of portfolio chairs (appointed by the board for a two-year term) who oversee specific portfolios necessary to manage the work of the activity centre. Chairs recruit and develop committee members.

Any member of the Society may attend and speak at activity centre council meetings.

On the Lifesaving Sport Council, **Brittany Wong** moved from Coaching Chair to Outreach Chair in February replacing Leslie Aziz. Ryan Foster was appointed Lifeguard Championship Chair and **Chloe Fong** was Social Media Engagement Chair from May to November.

On the Member Services Council, **Jennifer Evans** resigned as Rescue Commendation Chair in July and was replaced by Melanie Corbett in September.

On the Public Education Council, **Sydney Shelp** resigned as Swim to Survive Chair in April. **Megan Hutchison** resigned as Social Media Chair in October.

On the Management Training Council, Viktor Verblac was appointed Safety Management Inspection Courses Chair in February. **Jennifer Fruscella** was appointed Management Proficiency Chair in May. Nikolay Nikolov resigned as Webinar Chair to take up the Professional Development portfolio in June. **David Pignataro** resigned as Pool Operator Chair in October and Jonathan Wyatt replaced him in December.

On the Safety Standards Council, **Patrick D'Almada** was appointed Safety Audit Services Courses Chair and Andrea Slade was appointed Safety Standards Chair in May. Wasi **Rizvi** was appointed Safety Standards Research Chair in June. The Council added a new Technology Chair position in June.

Area Services Council

Annual Conference

Lifesaving Society Ontario hosted its 115th Annual General Meeting and Affiliate Recognition Awards presentations on the evening of April 12, 2024, at the Hilton Toronto/Markham Suites Conference Centre and Spa. The Society's area chairs convened in person the following day for their annual Area Chair Conference.

Eva McDonald Memorial Prize

Callista Ginevro was the recipient of the 2024 Eva McDonald Memorial Prize, which is presented to an undergraduate in the University of Toronto Faculty of Kinesiology & Physical Education who makes a significant contribution to the development of aquatics and lifesaving education through the university and the Lifesaving Society.

The prize is awarded jointly by the Lifesaving Society and the Faculty's Alumni Association. Eva McDonald, a member of the Lifesaving Society for over 40 years, died in 1969 while serving as Ontario President. Eva graduated from the Faculty and was President of its Alumni Association.

Hilary M. Weston Award

In 2024, one individual earned Lifesaving Society certifications through the Hilary M. Weston Award — a bursary for youth who would otherwise be unable to afford to participate in the Society's training program. The Society provides selected youth with the examination and required support literature. Award recipients undergo lifesaving training under the auspices of an affiliate member whom the Society invites to waive its registration fees.

The Society instituted the Hilary M. Weston Award in 2001 in grateful recognition of the Lieutenant Governor's Patronage of the Society from 1997–2002.

Information and communication services

In 2024, we:

- Published four issues of our digital newsletter *Lifeliner* for 190,800 subscribers.
- Distributed 30 direct email campaigns to members.
- Implemented staff-wide cybersecurity training to increase awareness and recognition of outside threats to Society network and data.
- Met Web Content Accessibility Guidelines on each of our eight websites, dozens of documents and social media platform content to increase accessibility to individuals with disabilities.
- Updated our infrastructure to accommodate remote work while maintaining and improving member services including:
 - » A VOIP phone system so members can reach staff who work remotely
 - » Transfer of hard copy to electronic documents for easy access by all staff
 - » Implementation of Microsoft SharePoint and Teams to increase communication and collaboration among activity centres
- Supported the work of the Society's activity centres with projects including National Drowning Prevention Week and the Go Blue campaign for World Drowning Prevention Day, which saw landmarks like the CN Tower and Niagara Falls light up blue.
- Achieved a viewership/readership reach of 1.2 billion for our drowning prevention messages across various media.
- Grew and engaged social media audiences with 21% more posts than in 2023, 12% more followers, 30% more impressions, 93% more shares and 34% more reactions.


